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What happened at Rocky Mountain College?

Rocky Mountain College was formed 23 years ago when Mountain View Bible College and Hillcrest Christian College were merged. For over 130 combined years, RMC and its heritage colleges have provided biblical training for adults heading into ministry as professionals or as lay people.

Last year, we seized the opportunity to deliver our Bible and leadership training courses in a whole new way. Pathways is Rocky Mountain College in a new form. We are still a Bible College. We still teach Biblical courses, and Leadership and Human Services courses for our students who obtain certificates, diplomas and degrees. Our students pursue a wide range of leadership opportunities, in traditional ministry positions, at agencies or as lay people in their fields.

Some of you have asked, "What happened to Rocky Mountain College?"

Now that we have moved to a distributed learning model which uses online education along with our classroom based education, some of our long time supporters and alumni are concerned that Rocky Mountain College has lost the campus community, face-to-face education, and a focus on biblical ministry.

Not so! We are happy to report that our students continue to benefit from Christian community wherever they are in ministry, in the classroom, or while they study online with us. Furthermore, there is a growing body of evidence about how vibrant, rich and rewarding **online communities** can be for Christian students who engage with each other and professors through live online conversations, threaded chats, and other online forums.

What we have gained is this: We can now reach students we could not have reached before.

They are "**adult learners**" with families, and jobs, and often ministry positions. They could not leave wherever they are to come to Rocky Mountain College.

They are "**applied learners**". They apply what they are learning immediately because they are learning and working at the same time. Educational studies show that applied learning is a better way to learn, to understand concepts and put them into practice right away. This is the basis of internships, apprenticeships, articling and practicums in the fields of medicine, law, education and many trades.

At Rocky Mountain College, we are focused on how we can have the same biblical and professional content we've always had.

RMC is prayerfully pursuing the opportunities, and exciting role we are playing in building God's kingdom across Canada and even internationally!

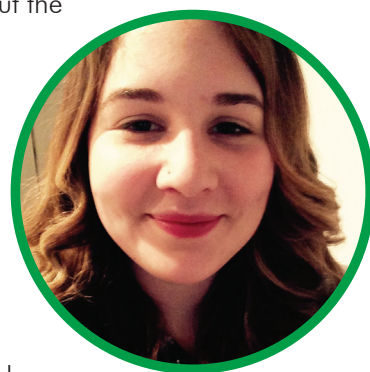
