Since then, he's spent time as a youth pastor in western Canada, currently serving as a Senior Associate Pastor at Sherwood Park Alliance Church. His time in ministry birthed his vision to create "PRAXiS", a Biblical, practical, relevant, and engaging training resource for local churches. It's designed as a free video curriculum available to



anyone and everyone trying to reach teenagers with the Gospel. The heart of PRAXiS is a well produced curriculum, by people in youth ministry, for people in youth ministry. A recent social media post gives a further glimpse into Brody's heart: I don't know what I'm doing 90% of the time. I wasn't "ready" to volunteer with my son as a video tech. But church involvement can't be passive. It's all hands on deck, a willingness to say "yes." In God's Kingdom faithfulness will always be more important than expertise or experience. I wanted my guy to see that church is a place for him to contribute, not just consume. Brody's Kingdom heart is to see leaders, whether those in youth ministry, or his own son, provided with the resources needed so they can say "yes!" to the call of ministry!



Joel Pippus

graduated from RMC in 2012 with a Bachelor of Religious Studies. Working with youth has always been a passion of his. In recent years he has

been able to marry that passion and his passion for skateboarding through his work with Hull Services — an organization committed to helping child and youth mental health. Through his work at Hull, Joel is the project lead for a project called *Push to Heal* which highlights the connection between Dr. Bruce Perry's Neurosequential Model (NM) and how kids who use skateparks can experience therapeutic intervention on many levels. Joel has seen first-hand how time spent in the skatepark has a direct positive impact on the work happening with kids in crisis. In the past several months, Joel has taken *Push to Heal* to the next level, joining Pathways to Prevention: A Centre for Developmental Trauma as a Training and Education Facilitator and continuing as the project lead for *Push To Heal*, bringing his training in NM and its connection to skateboarding and passing it along to others who work with children with childhood trauma.
